



5. Enactus: Project Nuri

PROJECT NURI

Enactus, St. Stephen's College took up Project Nuri-which involved the production of pickles and other

preservatives - in an attempt to uplift the poor communities, especially old age women by helping them achieve an economically better-living state.

We managed to achieve the following through the means of our initiative: Proper ideation and appropriate research and testing related to the raw material and their ratio used were carried out. Target communities were approached to set up the project.A list of potential NGOs along with the proposal is ready. Plan of action- these NGOs will soon be contacted with our project proposal and will start developing the project business plan with the NGO that is ready to collaborate with us.

We aim to create a self-sustainable business model with the NGO to establish a circular income flow model with our target community. The initial support in form of capital and other professional support will be provided by team Enactus, St. Stephen's College till the project reaches the self-sustainable level.



6. Enactus: Project Trishna

PROJECT TRISHNA

Enactus, St. Stephen's College took up Project Trishna -which involves the production of low-cost water filters made using sustainable material- in an attempt to uplift the poor communities in areas affected by the water crisis by helping them achieve a healthier living state. We researched the ongoing water crisis in

India and how it is affecting people, with a special focus on Delhi- NCR regions. We identified the target regions facing a severe water crisis and set up our target community accordingly.

We researched the specific ratios of silver, clay and dust used to make the model. We reached out to the potter community for the production of our prototype. We made 5 water filters containing different ratios of silver and clay to test for efficiency. We contacted governmental and private laboratories to test our filtered water sample.

Our team undertook a field visit in October 2021-2023 to the Delhi Jal Board where research and understanding of the process of testing were undertaken. A careful analysis of the costs involved was also done so that we could figure out the costs as per our needs and requirements. The filtered samples are now in the process of testing. We expect to impact 40 members of the community directly, 200 indirectly and even more when the project is made self-sufficient.

The project targets a wide demographic of various ethnicities and religions.





7. Enactus: Visit to Bachon Ka Ghar Orphanage

Date: 8 November 2023

Asha Project is a compassionate initiative dedicated to brightening the lives of orphans. It encompasses a heartfelt day at their nurturing abode, where we immerse ourselves in meaningful interactions. This year Enactus visited Bachon ka Ghar Orphanage with the aim to forge connections that transcend the boundaries of circumstance by blending joyful learning and playful activities. The project also empowers the women of the potter community, strengthening our

project Chirag as the diyas made by them were used for creative activities at the orphanage, shining the light of Asha(hope) in the young minds.








8. Pandemic Archives by History Society

9. Bazm e Adab Rading Circle

Bazm-e-Adab, in collaboration with the Gender Studies Cell, organized a reading circle on November 9th to explore Rajinder Singh Bedi's "Lajwanti." The event delved into the themes of gender, trauma, and power dynamics through the lens of partition literature. Dr. Shamim Ahmed facilitated discussions around the story's portrayal of silence and the marginalization of women. The reading circle offered a platform for critical analysis and fostered a deeper understanding of the intersection of gender and literature.



10. Gender Studies Cell

The Gender Studies Cell of St. Stephen's College had an enriching year, filled with both academic as well as non-academic events including lectures, panel discussions, reading circles, collaboration series, Let's Talks, and film screenings. The academic year came to a closure with its annual fest *Sarfarosh*, and the official release of its annual newsletter *Kön*.

The year began with a vibrant orientation that attracted a significant turnout from enthusiastic first-year students. This event introduced them to our wide range of activities and set the stage for the inclusive dialogue we aimed to nurture.

Throughout the year, we hosted five engaging 'Let's Talk' sessions, each addressing crucial issues of gender, society, identity, caste and their intersections. These sessions provided a safe space for students to openly share their experiences and ideas on topics addressing concerns that affect them. The themes of the Let's Talk sessions were as follows - 'Navigating

Elitism in Campus Spaces', 'Love Laws: Exploring Identities and Legislation,' 'Gender and Disability in the University Space', 'Identities and Citizenship: Sectarian Politics and the Nation' and 'Queering Indian Cinema'.

Our efforts culminated in several significant events, including our mini-festival, 'Voices from the Intersection', where we collaborated with various societies to foster a sense of community. Beginning on 7th November 2023, the three-day fest platformed speakers and organized discussions and reading circles about discourses on intersectional subjectivities. The inaugural lecture was delivered by research scholar Shainal Kabir Verma. This was followed by a student panel discussion in collaboration with the North-East Society. For Day 2, we hosted a lecture by Dr. Mridula Rashmi Kindo in collaboration with the Adivasi Toli, followed by a Let's Talk in collaboration with the Enabling Unit. On Day 3 we hosted a lecture by journalist Fatima Khan in collaboration with the Gandhi Ambedkar Study Circle, following which we organized a reading circle with Bazm-e-Adab. Such collaborative events created an environment conducive to compelling socio-political discussions, engaging with intersectionalities and the ways they operate in society.

We also launched a reading club that explored the theme 'Bodies Beyond Binaries'. In two captivating sessions, we delved into works like *Breast Stories* by Mahasweta Devi and *The Laugh of the Medusa* by Hélène Cixous. Participants were encouraged to critically examine societal constructs related to gender and embodiment. Enthusiastic participation by students has encouraged us to organize many such reading sessions afterward.

Our commitment to amplifying marginalized voices was further highlighted through a series of impactful film screenings. On 21st November 2023, we featured the documentary 'Trans Kashmir' which documents the lives of transgender individuals in Kashmir. The screening was followed by a discussion with Surbhi Dewan, the director. On 18th March, we screened a documentary on the lives of sex workers and their children by journalist Bhumika Saraswati which was followed by a discussion with her. On 21st March 2024, we collaborated with the Cine Club to screen 'Margarita with a Straw' which was followed by a Let's Talk session on 'Queering Indian Cinema'. These screenings sparked meaningful discussions and raised awareness about various pressing issues in society.

To further broaden the scope of our discourse, we introduced *Raqt*, an online platform open to submissions from the entire student community. This initiative allowed the Gender Studies Cell to amplify diverse voices and perspectives, through digital means. It increased our reach and the audience, helping to build a larger collective understanding of gender-related issues.




has thus been able to achieve its objectives and plans to go beyond and explore new avenues of expression and solidarity.
