Brief overview of the Trip:

Day 1: 5th October, 2024

The trip began with students departing college at 10:00 AM. After a long journey, they reached Sikandra at 3:00 PM. By 5:30 PM, they visited the historical tombs of Akbar and Mariam, exploring the rich Mughal architecture and learning about the emperor's legacy. The group took time to enjoy the peaceful gardens surrounding the monuments. After the sightseeing, they returned to the hotel to rest and prepare for the following day's early start.

Day 2: 6th October, 2024

An early morning began with a visit to the iconic Taj Mahal at 5:30 AM, allowing the group to experience its beauty at sunrise. They returned to the hotel by 9:00 AM for breakfast. At 11:00 AM, they left for the Agra Fort, exploring its majestic palaces and courtyards. After a 3:00 PM lunch, they visited Itimad-ud-Daulah's Tomb and Mehtab Bagh by 5:30 PM, enjoying views of the Yamuna River. Some students and faculty also visited the Jama Masjid before returning for dinner.

Day 3: 7th October, 2024

After breakfast, the group left the hotel at 8:00 AM and reached Fatehpur Sikri by 11:00 AM. They toured the main complex at 12:30 PM, appreciating the grandeur of Akbar's capital. At 3:00 PM, they visited the imposing Buland Darwaza, marveling at its architectural brilliance. The historical insights and rich cultural experiences made a lasting impression. At 4:30 PM, they departed Agra and returned to Delhi by 9:00 PM, concluding an educational and memorable three-day journey.

This experience left us with lasting memories, immense knowledge and a renewed passion for exploring our collective past.

Day Trip to Rakhigarhi

The History Society organized an unforgettable day trip to Rakhigarhi, one of the largest and most significant sites of the Indus Valley Civilisation, on 22nd March, 2025. This trip was organised in collaboration with the Department of Archaeology and Museums, Haryana.

Upon arrival, participants embarked on a guided visit to the archaeological site. The tour was led by Dr. Apu Saharan, who provided fascinating insights into the settlement's layout, artifacts, and significance within the broader Indus Valley network. The visit allowed students to witness firsthand the remnants of an urban civilization that once thrived over 4,500 years ago.

Following the site visit, lunch was served at the resort. After the break, participants engaged in a pottery workshop and were demonstrated traditional techniques and encouraged hands-on learning, linking craft practices to ancient cultural expressions.

The group departed from Rakhigarhi enriched by a day of discovery and dialogue. The trip offered a unique blend of academic learning and immersive experience, making the past come vividly to life.

I. H. Qureshi Memorial Lecture

The Department of History, St. Stephen's College organised its 18th I. H. Qureshi Memorial Lecture on the 6th of January 2025. This years Lecture was delivered by Prof. Richard Eaton, Professor of History, University of Arizona. The event was chaired by Prof. Farhat Hassan from the University of Delhi.

The title of the Lecture was "Exploring the Deccan: A Historical Analysis by Prof. Richard M. Eaton". Prof. Eaton, an esteemed historian, delved into the cultural and technological dynamics between Northern and Southern Deccan, focusing on the Chalukya legacy. This day long event was organised in two sessions and Prof. Eaton left the audience captivated with his research.

Satyam Jha Paper Presentation Series

The History Society of St. Stephen's College invites abstracts for The Satyam Jha Paper Presentation Series, a two-day conference at St. Stephen's College. The presentation series is dedicated to Satyam Jha, a student of History at St. Stephen's college, member of The History Society and a friend to many of us, whom we lost to COVID-19 in 2021. Active and engaging, Satyam discussed, critiqued and shared ideas on themes in history and politics; in his memory, this series hopes to fuel many such interactions and exchanges among students.

This year's theme was titled 'Framing Gender: Spatial Boundaries and Identity in Architectural History.' Invitees were requested to submit their papers in accordance to a concept note curated for this theme. The judges for the Paper Presentation Series were Dr. Sabina Kazmi and Dr. Snigdha Singh. 'Tombs and a Tale Through Time' - Safdarjung's Tomb and Lodhi Gardens Walk – 7.04.2025

The Talks and Walks vertical organised a walk to Safdarjung's Tomb and Lodhi Gardens. The walk was led led by Eva Tewary and Himakshi Vinay, and accompanied by Dr. Jeena Sarah Jacobs and Dr. Sabina Kazmi. The walk explored the late Mughalera grandeur of Safdarjung's Tomb, a symbol of declining imperial power, and the Lodhi Gardens, home to 15th- and 16th-century tombs from the Sayyid and Lodhi dynasties. Through detailed historical commentary, participants engaged with narratives of political transition, architectural evolution, and the shaping of Islamicate heritage in Delhi's urban landscape.

Tarikh – The Annual Journal of the History Society

Tarikh is the annual journal of The History Society, St. Stephen's College. Its editions study themes in History, and at the confluence of History and other disciplines, from varied and curious perspectives.

Tarikh 2024-25 sought to examine tourism as a lens to reveal aspects of normal practices that would otherwise remain opaque, seeing tourism's discursion as a tool to uncover the social world. It aimed to study the organisation and regulation of the separate social practices of leisurely travel and organised, working travel. Counter-intuitively, it also seeks to trace the evolution of tourism into another form of organised travel in modern times. How places are chosen to be gazed upon—through a constructed fantasy or anticipation of experiential pleasure—is also a function of social patterning; images of Paris as the 'Romance Capital of the World', or the mountains and countryside as 'escapes.' The reproduction and redistribution of the idea of such spaces, through print media, memory or spoken word, is also of interest.
